

Fluorouracil and Pet Safety

For many households, pets are our best friends. For some people they are also indispensable service animals. Many show their affection by licking us. Others like to chew on things—your furniture, your shoes, your purse — anything that's within reach. This includes medicated cream containers you apply to your skin that are stored on your nightstand or the countertop.

Sadly, the FDA has received reports involving dogs that were exposed to one type of medicated cream called fluorouracil. All the dogs died. If your medicine contains fluorouracil, immediately move it somewhere out of reach of your pets and keep them from licking your skin where you've applied the medicine. Why? Because fluorouracil, if ingested, can be deadly to pets.

What is fluorouracil?

Fluorouracil, also called "5-FU" or "5-fluorouracil," is an FDA-approved chemotherapy drug commonly used to treat a wide variety of cancers in people, including some types of skin cancers and a condition called solar or actinic keratosis, which can lead to skin cancer. It's also used to treat warts in children and occasionally in veterinary medicine to treat cancers in horses. Fluorouracil is available either as a solution for injection or as a topical cream or topical solution that's applied on the skin. The containers of topical cream or topical solution may include the brand names Efudex, Carac, Tolak, and Fluoroplex or state "Fluorouracil."

Why is fluorouracil important to know about if you have pets?

Pets can be exposed to fluorouracil by chewing on containers, usually tubes, of topical fluorouracil or by licking the area of your skin where you applied the medicine. FDA has not yet received any reports of fluorouracil poisoning in cats or other pets but recommends that this drug also be kept away from all pets for their safety.

Signs of fluorouracil poisoning in pets can start within 30 minutes, and include vomiting, shaking, seizures, difficulty breathing, and diarrhea. Death can happen in as little as 6 to 12 hours after a pet is exposed to fluorouracil. If your pet comes into contact with fluorouracil, seek immediate veterinary care, and bring the container of fluorouracil with you.

Many pet owners, health care providers, including dermatologists and pharmacists, and even veterinarians may be unaware of how deadly fluorouracil is to animals. Because of this, FDA asked makers of fluorouracil topical products to add new wording to the product labels that warn users about the danger to pets. For example, the new wording states, "May be fatal if your pet licks or ingests. Avoid allowing pets to contact this tube or your skin where fluorouracil has been applied. Store and dispose out of reach of pets."

What can pet owners do to keep pets safe?

Minutes matter when it comes to fluorouracil poisoning. Immediately contact your veterinarian or local emergency veterinary hospital if your pet licks the area where you applied fluorouracil or chews the container and consumes some of the fluorouracil. Make sure the veterinarian knows your pet was exposed to fluorouracil.

You may be wondering what you can do to keep your pet safe from your fluorouracil. Simple--keep all products containing fluorouracil out of reach of your pets.

- Store the container in a closed cabinet or on a shelf the animal cannot reach.
- Dispose of empty containers in areas that are inaccessible to your pet.
- Talk to your health care provider about whether you should cover the treated area with clothing or gauze to prevent your pet from licking your skin.

How do I report a fluorouracil problem to FDA?

If your pet has a problem with fluorouracil or any other human or animal drug, please report it to FDA's Center for Veterinary Medicine.

In the meantime, keep all drugs for people and animals stored safely and out of reach of your pet. Safely storing your fluorouracil topical products can save your pet's life.

Energy? Does He Have ADHD? Pat Miller, CBCC-KA, CPDT-KA Published: February 14, 2023

A high-energy dog's behavior might beg a comparison to the symptoms of humans with Attention Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder or hyperactivity, but these diagnoses are rare in dogs. Labels aside, let's talk strategies for dealing with all that energy.

I can empathize with canine caretakers who live with high-energy dogs, whether puppies, adolescents, or adults (yes, they come in all ages). Last week, a client brought me Abby, her 14-week-old Belgian Shepherd with concerns about high-energy behavior and mouthing. The only time Abby settled during the entire session was for about five minutes when she was chewing on a cow ear. Had it not been for my assistant who kept her busy with toys, this adorable but energetic canine child would have been launching herself at me and spearing me with her needle-sharp baby teeth for two hours.

Many dogs have lots of energy – perhaps more than their owners wished for – and express this with exuberance. But very few dogs are genuinely hyperactive. Make sure your dog gets enough exercise, physical and mental, and give her frequent opportunities to practice self-control exercises.

High-Energy, Hyper, or ADHD?

High energy dog antics are often mistaken for symptoms of canine hyperactivity/ADHD. While this pathological condition does exist, it's rare, and isn't the same as high-energy. Hyperactivity, or "hyperkinesis," can be defined as "displaying frenetic activity, abnormally short attention spans, and high impulsiveness." If you think your dog really has canine ADHD, seek the assistance of a veterinary behaviorist to determine appropriate diagnosis, treatment and medication. Dealing With High-Energy Dogs


I know our very active baby Belgian didn't have ADHD because she could stay focused and engaged for a reasonable time, and demonstrated an appropriate degree of impulse control for a high-energy puppy. At the end of our session, I suggested the following:

- **Canine playmates.** Find well-matched playmates (puppies or adults) to defray some of Abby's energy and teach her social skills (including appropriate use of her mouth.)
- Good manners training. Continue a program of training basic good manners with a qualified force-free trainer.
- Mouthing/nipping management. Teaching your dog to go to and relax on her mat is helpful. (See "Mat Training Tips," January 2020 issue of Whole Dog Journal, to learn how.) Remote-controlled treat-dispensing tools such as the PupPod (see "Gear of the Year," January 2023 issue of Whole Dog Journal) and/or a Pet Tutor (see "Gear of the Year," January 2016 issue of Whole Dog Journal) can be used to easily move her away from you when she's being mouthy. You can also teach her the "Walk Away" exercise to move her away from other people. (See "How to Teach Your Dog to Just Walk Away," September 2018 issue of Whole Dog Journal.)
- Increase exercise. Being careful not to overdo impact on puppy joints, increase your dog's aerobic exercise running in the back yard, chasing toys, playing tug, etc. to include several 20- to 30-minute sessions of active exercise per day. (See "Ways to Calm Down Your High-Energy Dog," September 2017 issue of Whole Dog Journal.

- **Teach your dog to do scent work.** Using their noses (and brains) is excellent for a dog's mental and physical enrichment. (See "How to Teach Your Dog to Play Nose Games," September 2019 issue of Whole Dog Journal)
- Play cognition games with your dog. Cognition games such as object, shape, or color discrimination are also terrific for mental and physical enrichment that will help focus and tire your dog. (See "Are Canines Cognitive," October 2017 issue of Whole Dog Journal.)
- Practice impulse control. Behaviors that strengthen a dog's ability to control
 her own behavior, such as Wait, Leave It, and Go to Your Mat, are invaluable.
 (See "Control Yourself! Dog Impulse Control Training," November 2021issue of
 Whole Dog Journal.)
- Use management tools such as an exercise pen or crate. Don't be afraid to use a crate or exercise pen as an option to manage your dog's behavior so you can give yourself a break from having to constantly monitor her energy and activity. Help her be comfortable with this arrangement by giving her a long-lasting chew object or frozen, food-filled toy to enjoy. (See "Creative Confinement: Dog Crate Alternatives," March 2022 issue of Whole Dog Journal.)

You Can Do It!

The level of energy a dog like Abby has can be daunting, but don't give up! Find activities that your dog loves, give her plenty of appropriate enrichment outlets for her mental and physical energy, help her learn how to control her behavior, and the two of you can have a long and active life together.




