Being a Club Treasurer is great for someone that likes dealing with numbers and keeping track of ongoing activities.

In today's world of different methods of paying for items, the job has become a bit more challenging.

One of the original ways of paying is still by writing a check.

PLEASE, PLEASE, PLEASE, when writing a check:

- ❖ Use dark ink. Yes, pink and light green ink are cute, **but**, do not always photo well.
- ❖ Ideally use a ball point pen. Checks sent by mail can get damp, get handled by other people, and put in a mail box on a rainy day.
- ❖ Some types of ink can smear when dampened and become unreadable.
- ❖ **MOST IMPORTANT**, when you sign a check do not go over the codes on the bottom of the check with your signature. It makes the codes unreadable. This results in making a trip to the bank for an in-person deposit. I like using the remote deposit method.
- ❖ **Your help in this matter is very much appreciated!!**

In dog training there are no absolutes. There is not one way. No single method or technique that will work for every dog, for every scenario. Yet we are always searching for that magic pill. You know, the one that has “the answer”. It will fix it. Apply this technique every time and the dog will know what to do. And when we can’t find it, we get frustrated. Sometimes we try a method a few times and throw it out the window. It’s not working. Then emotions get involved. We start labeling the dog. The dog is: not trying, blowing us off, sensitive, independent, lazy, not in the mood, etc. We start beating ourselves up: we are terrible trainers, we can’t get it right, we are losers, we are letting people down and so on. None of which is productive.

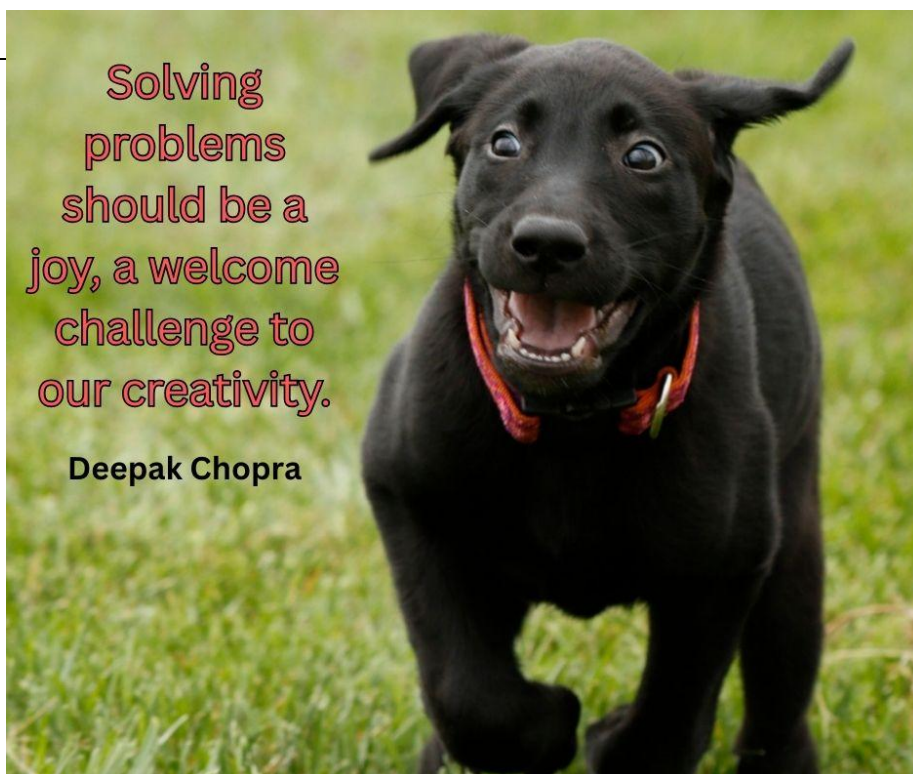
Instead, we need to realize that there is never one answer. And if something works now, it might not work later. And vice versa. Training dogs is fluid, ever changing. Moment by moment, day by day. The dog is a living, breathing, feeling, thinking being. We must be flexible. We must be willing to change and adapt. We must experiment. We must be problem solvers. If you want to do something where when X happens you do Y, then you need a different hobby.

Often when I come up with a training method for certain scenarios, I get questions asking if it will also work here, here and there. The answer is maybe. It depends. Sometimes I recommend a strategy for handling an error. A few weeks later I might suggest a different strategy. And the student comments “But, a few weeks ago you said to handle it that way.” Yes, I did. And now I’m saying you should do something different. Why? Because the scenario is different. The root cause of the error is different. Maybe the environment is different. It all depends. I strongly recommend students get other viewpoints. Take classes, watch webinars, go to seminars, listen to podcasts, get ideas. The more ideas you have, the more possible solutions you can come up with. I’m not staying jump from technique to technique. Try something for two training sessions then switch to something else. But have an open mind. Be creative. Be willing to try different things. More importantly, work on perfecting your ability to read your dog.

The possible solutions I come up with always depend on why. Why did that happen. Why did the dog respond that way. Is the dog confused? Worried? Nervous? Anxious? Distracted? Curious? Feeling pressure? What I do varies considerably based on the Why. Sometimes the why is crystal clear. Often, it’s clear as mud. And our job is to figure it out. It doesn’t matter how many years we’ve been training dogs. Or how many dogs we’ve trained. Each dog presents unique challenges. It’s never easy or straight forward. Dog training really is an art. It requires creativity, curiosity, an open mind, and a passion for solving puzzles. Embrace that challenge!

Oregon Update: “Animal Cruelty” Ballot Measure Inching Closer to Qualifying- Do Not Sign!

Animal rights activists continue gathering signatures in Oregon to put an extreme measure on the November 2026 ballot that would criminalize the killing and breeding of animals. This initiative has been attempted in previous election cycles, although it has never qualified for the ballot.

The campaign in favor of the initiative reports having collected 87,776 of the necessary 117,173 to qualify for the November ballot. The deadline to finish gathering signatures to qualify is early July 2026. The American Kennel Club (AKC) is operating under the assumption that IP 28 *will* qualify for the November ballot. At the same time, AKC is working closely with numerous stakeholders impacted by the proposal who are optimistic that Oregonians will reject IP 28 upon learning just how radical and out of touch the proposal is.

That said, Oregonians are urged to not sign this petition for Initiative Petition 28 (IP28), even though it is being advertised as an “end to animal cruelty” and an effort to ensure “all animals have equal protection under the law.” In fact, this animal rights measure will criminalize all hunting, many breeding practices – and even many humane forms of dog training.

What You Can Do Today:

Supporters of this problematic measure must collect 117,173 signatures from registered Oregon voters to place this initiative on the 2026 ballot. You can help fight this by taking the following actions:

- 1) If you are approached, **do not sign the petition.**
- 2) Ask your friends and colleagues not to sign the petition. Also remind exhibitors at Oregon dog shows and events, students in training and CGC classes, owners who have purchased a dog from you, etc. to not sign the petition.
- 3) If you notice a business distributing petitions and collecting signatures, respectfully express your concerns and ask them not to collect signatures for this ballot measure.
- 4) Discuss IP 28 with your fellow club members, colleagues, and neighbors to raise awareness in case IP 28 qualifies for the November 2026 ballot.

Summary

In the words of supporters, IP28, known as the “People for the Elimination of Animal Cruelty Exemptions (PEACE) Act, *“prohibits any activity—other than self-defense and veterinary practices—that intentionally injures, kills, or sexually violates an animal, many of which are currently legal because they are exempt from our animal cruelty laws.”*

Among many provisions, IP 28 does the following:

- Criminalizes standard husbandry practices and numerous agriculture and other humane animal activities and practices (including hunting), as well as “reasonable handling and training techniques”, all of which are protected under current law
- Criminalizes artificial insemination and equates it to sexual assault of an animal.
- Provides a vague exemption for veterinary practices, but it is unclear how this would impact ear cropping and tail docking.
- Removes the word “intentional”, thereby criminalizing even unintentional harm or neglect of any animal including wildlife. While responsible animal ownership and care is always the goal, unfortunate accidents can happen. No one wants to see an animal come to harm or injury, but it is an unfortunate reality that, just as with people, accidents can occur in everyday activities despite taking appropriate precautions.

For example, there are incidents where an animal may be harmed in a vehicle or other accident: a service or working dog; a dog participating in a safe, humane event; or even a dog with an exuberant spirit and high energy could, during an activity, receive an injury through no fault of the owner.

This initiative will also have dire consequences on ranchers, farmers, fishermen, 4-H and similar groups, and even pest control.

AKC will continue to provide updates as new details become available.

This is great news for all of us with young dogs or dogs that need a little extra practice in a trial setting.

There are so many reasons to take advantage of this great class:

- Praising your dog is encouraged.
- Novice dogs can enter Utility.
- An accredited judge who can give feedback.
- Lower entry fees.
- You can choose a Wild Card exercise to receive full points - then skip it or do it anyway.
- The class is held in the obedience ring after trial #1 completes so you can either fix today's problems or practice for tomorrow in the same ring.

All that said, this is a real class. There are no do-overs. You cannot NQ, so take the time to ensure likely success on the first try, whatever that looks like for you. Multiple commands are scored as usual.

A favorite judge and past instructor of mine said to me "the class is scored, and the highest score gets 1st place. But the lowest score WINS because they used the class wisely"

So, I encourage everyone to try Wild Card. It would be wonderful to see these non-regular classes added to more trials. It took only one try for me, and I was hooked. I think you will be, too.

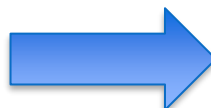

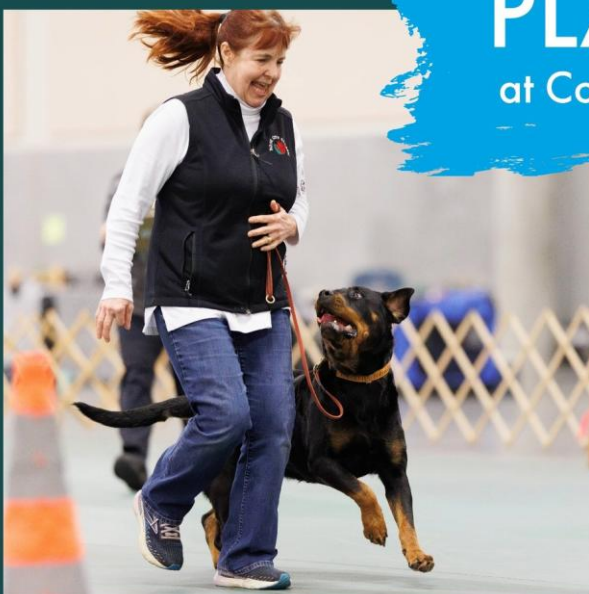

Emma and I enjoyed doing Rally and Agility at the Rose City Classic.

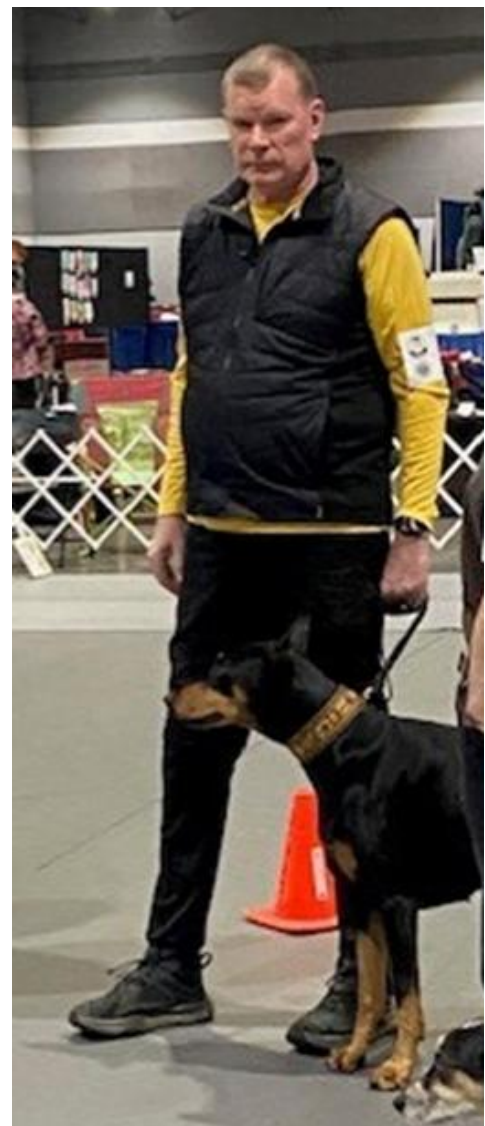
Thursday was a great day for us getting Q's in Choice and Master Rally, then heading over to the Agility ring and getting our first Q in Open Jumpers. Sweet.

7. I recommend socializing your puppy. I like to categorize socialization into 4 broad categories:

Dogs - This is socializing your puppy in a controlled environment such as puppy classes or puppy romp as these dogs are vaccination or in the process of their vaccination series.

Other options include socialization with friendly adult healthy vaccinated dogs in a supervised setting.

People -I recommend socializing Rosie around people that you are comfortable with.

Experiences - Rosie will benefit from new experiences such as car rides, walks in new neighborhoods, squirrels, vet visits, etc.

Self - Finally it is important to desensitize Rosie to being handled. Please play with his paws, ears, mouth, toes, bottom and various body parts. It will help in the future with medication, nail trims, ear checks, temperature taking and the comfort level of dog.

8. Additionally for socialization, I recommend following the rule of 7s:

- exposure to 7 different surfaces (hardwood, carpet, grass, concrete, etc.)*
- had 7 different toys (Kong's, ropes, plushies, squeaky, balls, etc.)*
- been to 7 different places (home, vet, neighborhood walks, puppy classes, etc.)*
- met and played with 7 different people (women, men, children, beards, baseball caps, etc.)*
- exposed to 7 different challenges (crate training, veterinary visits, potty training, leash training, socialization, etc.)*
- eaten from and in 7 different things/places (bowls, plates, in the kitchen, in their crate, in the bathroom, etc.)*

Reward, Reward, Reward!

Fitness Check for Pets

An ounce of prevention...is worth a pound of cure

This has never been truer. Our goal is for your “best friend” to live a long and healthy life. Here’s a tip to help assure that happens.

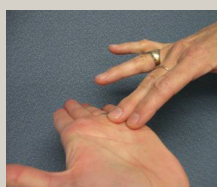
Many pet parents can tell if their pet is obese but what they might not realize is that our pets can suffer from weight-related problems long before they become *obese*. Especially in our canine companions, studies have shown that as little as 15% over their healthy ideal weight can shorten their lives by up to 2 years! Being just a little overweight can accelerate the development of painful joints, lameness and the progression of arthritis and the need for pain meds to live a comfortable life. If feline friends become portly, it increases their risk for developing diabetes, breathing problems, and arthritis.

There are simple ways to **prevent unhealthy weight gain** before the damage is done and it’s a lot easier than trying to lose weight later.

- Talk to your veterinary healthcare team about food recommendations when your pet is spayed or neutered. Your pet’s nutritional needs change and they require 25% fewer calories after surgery.
- Learn to do a body condition score (BCS) and check your pet’s BCS once a month and maintain a healthy 5/9 by feeling over their ribs.



Lightly run your fingers over your knuckles as you make a fist. If you imagine those knuckles were your dog/cat’s ribs, this would be too thin.



Put your palm up, fingers extended facing the ceiling. Run your fingers over the base of your fingers - this is too heavy.



Turn your hand over, palm down and feel over your knuckles. When your pet’s ribs feel like this, it’s just right - healthy lean BCS 5/9!

- Generally, your pet’s body weight at one year of age is close to their healthy weight and you can use that as a guide to keep them healthy.

Talk with your pet’s healthcare team to discuss questions you have about choosing the right food and making sure your pet keeps a fit body condition for a healthier life.

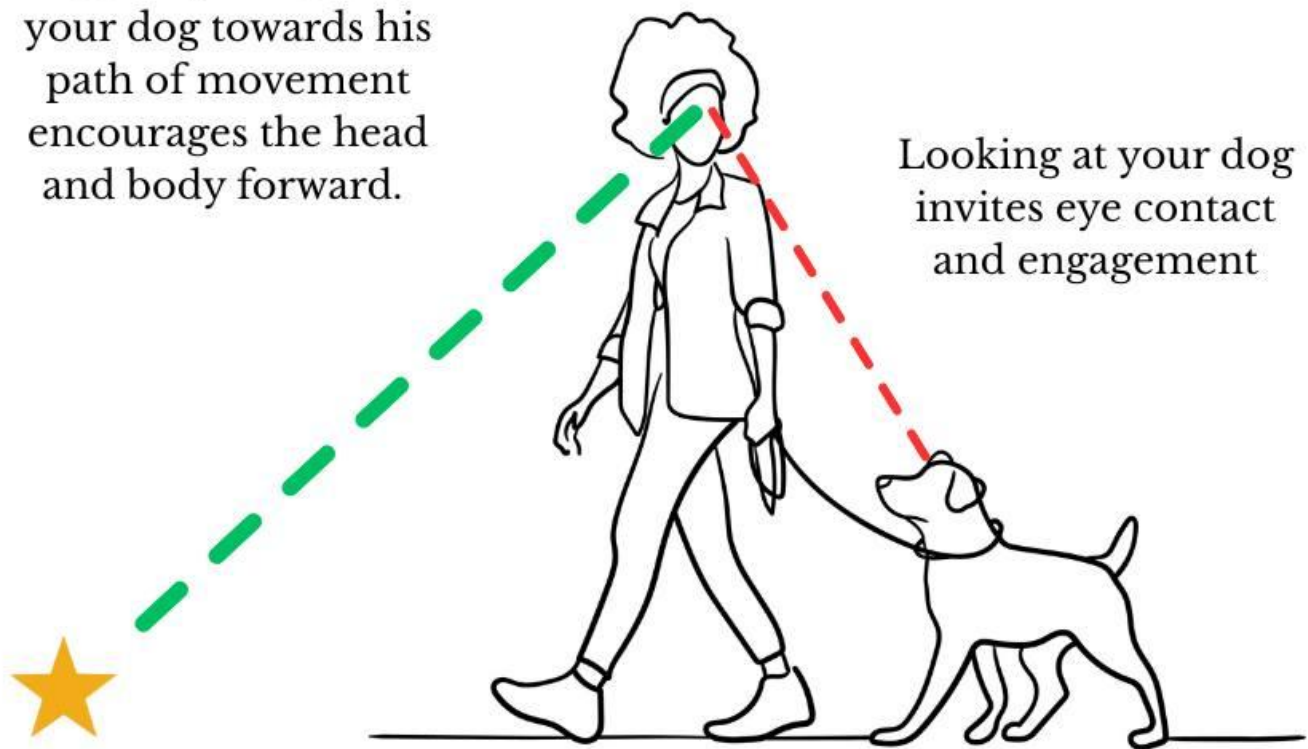

Where you look affects your dog

Looking in front of your dog towards his path of movement encourages the head and body forward.



Looking at your dog invites eye contact and engagement



Where you focus affects your dog and his or her movement. When you look at your dog's face, particularly into the eyes you are inviting eye contact which is not what we want for the show ring. This type of handler focus is desirable for sports like obedience or rally, but not for conformation.




For the show ring we prefer the dog to be forward focused. By looking towards the front of your dog or right into his path of movement you support and encourage the head to be facing forward.

Staring at your dog can be a difficult habit to break, but it's a good idea to try so you can avoid the dog watching your face while moving.

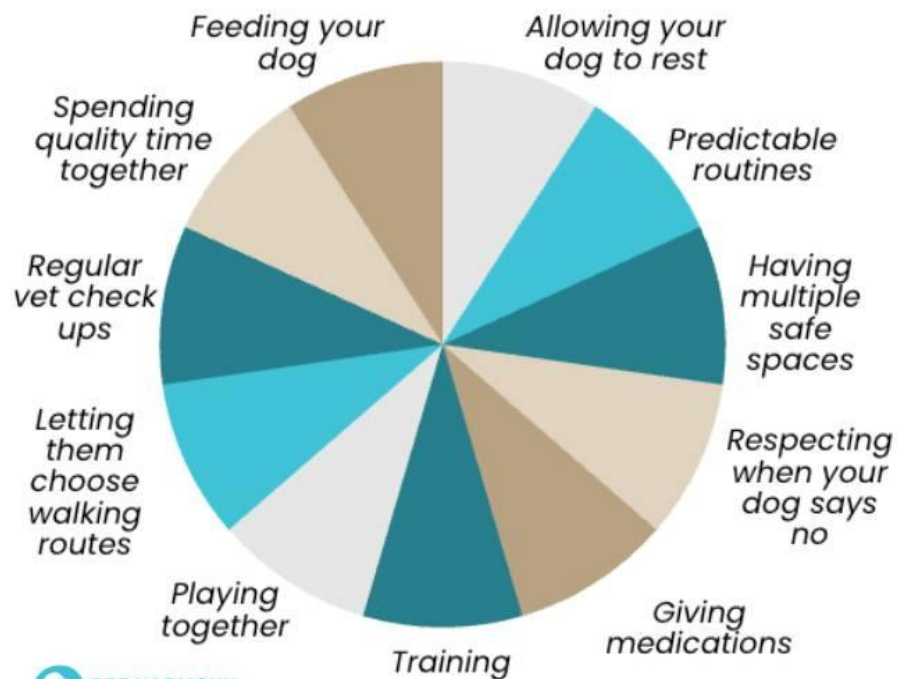
